Demolition Derby Competition Rules

- Reminder: that “Demolition Derbies” are potentially dangerous and whilst we check your car as thoroughly as we can in the short time we have, the final responsibility for your safety is your own.
- All drivers must have an AASA race licence for this event.
- No passengers allowed.
- There will be a minimum of 1 control car, plus 4 mobile spotlights.

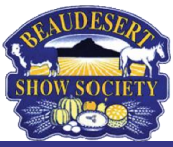
LIGHTS SYSTEM USED DURING DERBY:

Start of Derby:

- AMBER LIGHTS FLASHING - Get ready (5 seconds approx. to start)
- GREEN LIGHTS - Start and keep competing
- **During Derby:**
- RED LIGHTS FLASHING - Stop immediately (do not get out of car)
- DO NOT HIT, PUSH OR MOVE IN ANY WAY

RACE RULES:

- Drivers must stay within the boundary of the event perimeter (marked by the ring of tyres). IF YOU EXIT THE RING OF TYRES: STOP AND MAKE EVERY EFFORT POSSIBLE TO SLOWLY RE-ENTER THE RING AT THE SAME POINT BETWEEN THE SAME TWO TYRES. If you are in pursuit of a car and they leave the ring - don't go out there after him! If a competitor stays out side the ring, they will be warned via the spotlight.
- All cars who exit the ring will be spotlighted and drivers must obey to the directions given to them.
- Any competitor chasing another competitor outside the ring will be classed as unsportsmanlike and reckless behaviour, and will be disqualified.
- Any competitor who continually disregards the rules will be instantly disqualified.
- Any person who does not respond to the spotlight or ignores will be disqualified immediately. It is the discretion of the committee and at no time will bad behaviour be tolerated.
- Bad sportsmanship: If we see an exhibition of bad sportsmanship during any event, we will have no hesitations in calling in security and escorting driver, passenger and car from the ring. The Show Society will advise QCAS of any disqualifications or warnings for any event. This can have implications for you at other shows such as Boonah, Ipswich, Beenleigh and Toowoomba. There is a chance if you are banned at one show, you might be banned at all – so play fair!
- At no time, is a competitor allowed to get out of the vehicle during the derby. Competitors must remain in car, with helmets and seatbelts left on until the derby has completely finished or you are instructed by officials to do so (look for red lights and spotlight sweeping the ring).
- FLAGS: Flags are positioned on the top of the car and left in the upright position while the vehicle is moving. You're your vehicle is stopped you must put your flag down. Once your flag is down, you are out of the competition and must remain parked until the finish. Once a vehicle remains in the same position for a period of 45 seconds and longer is deemed as no longer in the competition. You will be given a warning signal, any driver not responding to this signal will be removed from the competition.



- Intentional impact to the driver's door, is forbidden and will lead to disqualification.
- Abusive behaviour towards any officials will not be tolerated, immediate action will be taken and the offending person will be removed from the grounds immediately.
- In the case of an emergency, we have a designated ambulance inside the ring, at the back. If you need medical attention and can drive out of the ring, head to the nearest control car who will call over paramedics. For serious injuries or where a head/spinal injury is suspected do not exit the car. STOP IMMEDIATELY, break off flag and wave it out your windscreen. Paramedics will be called upon to give an assessment, if this is required the derby will be stopped. The decision to continue the event will be that of the committee. Remember the next hit can be life changing!
- The winning car is determined by the car that performs the **LAST EFFECTIVE HIT!** In the case of a non-conclusive finish, it will be up to the judge's discretion to determine a winner. To ensure fairness for all, representatives from local motor sporting groups as well as independent members from the Show Societies' executive committee will be present during the event to judge. Misdemeanours are judged by the frequency and severity of the offences. Mitigating factors such as a obvious lack of brakes, flat tyres, no reverse etc are also taken into account.
- Please note if it is not in the rule, you cannot do it.
